Fiddlers featured in local newspaper

Tradition. In modern times it can be hard to find. But there are those who insist that it be done the old way. Joy Halliwell and Ken Tooley are two of these people. Through persistent effort, and perseverance of a hobby and skill they both love, the District Four division of the Old Time Fiddlers of Idaho has been revitalized.

"The organization has been active for a long time, but due to lack of leadership, it disbanded a while back," says Halliwell, the new chairman of the IOTF. "I was active in the Oregon Old Time Fiddlers for eighteen years. Then after I had organized a jam session when I was snowbirding in Arizona, I had the idea to reinvigorate the District Four chapter, which bases in Emmett."

After Halliwell decided on the plan it didn't take long for her to contact the State President of the IOTF and learn that she needed to establish a residency in Idaho for two full years before she could carry out the idea. "We continued to play even though we weren't officially part of the organization," she said. "And the fact that we have access to the Heritage Hall

here in town for our local jams was one of the reasons we moved here."

The insistence on long held traditions of the group are taken very seriously.

"We have a model that we all follow," Halliwell says. "We are dedicated to the revival, and preservation of old time fiddle music." An aversion to amplified instruments has been a trademark of the group. "We are not amplified," she says. "Those are state IOTF rules."

The group will use microphones however for singers and accompanying instruments, and if the place where they are playing is very large they will mike the fiddles as well.

One of the places that the group plays is nursing homes, events like the Cherry Festival, and recently they had a gig for the Red Hat Society. "We are very family oriented," says Ken Tooley, a guitar player in the group. "We are willing and able to play almost anywhere if we are asked and we're always on the lookout for new members and to reactivate old members. There's so much talent out there and they have so much to offer. Many people say they're not good enough, so we encourage them to just come to a jam, sit in the background and practice, then when they're ready they can come up front. But even then, people in nursing homes really don't care if you make a mistake or not."

The IOTF consists of not only fiddles, but all stringed instruments, and those who sing as well. Halliwell encourages all those who might be interested in coming out for entertainment, or to join in on a jam session to stop by the Heritage Place Clubhouse at 12th and Johns on the first Tuesday of the month at seven o'clock. Or you can call Halliwell for more information at 398-8125.

Obituary

Elray A. Woerman

Elray August William Woerman, a resident of Moscow, Idaho, for 47 years, passed away peacefully Monday, March 7, 2005, at Good Samaritan Village in Moscow of age-related illness at the age of 95.

He was born Feb. 5, 1910, on the family farm in Cuming County, Neb., to Louis H. Woerman of Quincy, Ill., and Anna Rose Bettenhausen of Tenley Park, Ill. He attended West Point (Neb.) High School, graduating in 1928, and began work on the family farm until starting his own cross-country trucking company, Woerman Trucking Lines.

Born into a musical family, Elray studied classical violin before developing his love of fiddle music. His sister, Valna, played piano while his brother, Delwin, played accordion and concertina. Between the three of them, they played eight different instruments. The Woermans entertained for many a square dance or on the local radio station. Elray's love of music has continued through the generations in his children and grandchildren.

On June 24, 1942, he married Mildred Cecilia Nelson of Oakland, Neb., in West Point. Elray enlisted in the Army during World War II and served as sergeant and company clerk for the 518th Ordinance in Germany, Belgium, Ireland and France. His company landed at Normandy one month after D-Day. He served from 1942 until 1945, during which time Mildred taught

in a one-room school in Nebraska.

When the war ended, Elray and Mildred farmed the family acreage until 1946, when Elray joined his brother Delwin in Portland, Ore., to work for farm implement companies J.I. Case and John Deere, While in Portland, their three children Allyn, Wendy and Mark were born.

In 1955, John Deere Tractor Co. transferred Elray to Twin Falls and then in 1958 to Moscow to serve 11 area John Deere dealerships as territory manager. He traveled to Moscow, Lewiston, Clarkston, Grangeville, Kamiah, Garfield, Pullman, Tekoa, Oakdale, Endicott and Palouse.

In 1971, Elray chose early retirement rather than move his family to serve his remaining years with the company. It was then that he began working for local dealers in Moscow, Lewiston and Pullman, finally retiring in 1992 at age 82.

During this period of time, Elray had time to rekindle his love of music. He joined the Idaho Old Time Fiddlers in 1972, serving as chairman of District Nine, state president and state treasurer. Many trophies for Best in Senior Division decorate his home in Moscow.

After 45 years of marriage, Mildred died suddenly on March 23, 1988, from complications following surgery.

Alone for two years, Elray surprised his three children on his 80th birthday. He had found someone with whom he wanted to spend the rest of his life, Evalona Moser. Introduced to each other by Evalona's daughter, Linda, the two shared a love of fiddle music and family. On May 12, 1990, Elray and Evalona eloped to Coeur d'Alene, notifying his three children and her four children by mail on their way to their honeymoon.

Elray was a member of Emmanuel Lutheran Church of Moscow for many years, serving as head usher and council member. He was a 32nd degree Mason and a Shriner.

Surviving Elray are his wife of 15 years, Evalona, in Moscow, and a younger brother, Duane of Kearney,



After serving in the military he served a full-time mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Sweden for three years.



Article XII states: "a member may present to the Resolution Committee a proposed amendment to the By-Laws." Before presenting your idea, you will make sure you're not the only one who likes it. Does it promote the Objects of the Corporation as in Article IIA? Is it in the best interests of fiddlers and fiddling? If you're convinced, then follow each of the four steps below in the order given.

- Write a proposal recommending change or addition to a particular bylaw.
- 2. Present your proposal to the chairman of the Resolutions Committee. Members of the Committee may give you some helpful suggestions at this stage. The Committee will write the resolution in proper form for presentation to the Board.
 - 3. Attend the annual Spring Board

Meeting, and listen as the Directors review and comment on your proposal. After hearing their opinions, you may find that you wish to revise or even withdraw your proposal. If you wish to continue, then step 4 comes into play.

4. The Chairman of the Resolutions Committee will send the written resolution to the Idaho Fiddler Editor for printing one month before the annual State Convention. In the meantime, district chairmen will have been meeting with their districts and discussing the pros and cons of your idea in preparation for voting.

Publication allows for all voting members to be advised in writing of the coming election and of their opportunity to vote for or against your resolution. It takes a two-thirds vote of the members present to pass the resolution. If it passes, the Resolution Committee will attest to the vote and the change will be adopted and become part of the By-Laws.

It is important to note that publication of your resolution cannot take place until after the Board has met and reviewed and commented on it. This may impose a delay of as much as a year before the resolution is presented for vote by the general membership, which explains why the best time to present resolutions is at the Spring Board Meeting. For example, any resolutions presented to the Board at this time of year cannot be voted on until the State Convention in September 2006.

Obituary

Allan MacDonald

Allan MacDonald, 1978 Idaho State Fiddle Champion, beloved father and husband, passed away at his Bonners Ferry residence on Sunday, Oct. 9, 2005. At his bedside were his wife of 64 years, Mildred, and his children, Linda, Joel and Dorothy.

Allan was born in Tomkins, Saskatchewan, March 25, 1919, to Jim and Amelia MacDonald. He began his education in Cadillac, Saskatchewan, and completed his education in Bonners Ferry after his family made their permanent home there. Although Allan had to temporarily drop out of school twice to take his father's place at work until Jim recovered from serious illness, Allan valued education and graduated from Bonners Ferry High School in 1940.

While in high school, Allan worked for and boarded with Marjorie and Chauncey Guthrie which was how he and his future wife, Mildred, began to make beautiful music together — he on the fiddle and she on piano. They were married September 7, 1941, and eventually made their lifelong home on the farm her grandparents had homesteaded and where Mildred had been born. Allan worked for a time for the U.S. Forest Service on the fire crews and in lookouts; then he went to work for the Great Northern Railroad where he sometimes hitched a ride back to Bonners for the weekend with an old fiddling engineer named Joe Pancerzewski.

Allan worked for 22 years as a signalman and maintainer, leaving that job to become a partner in the local bowling alley. In his spare time, Allan farmed, worked as a gunsmith, made hand-crafted violins (a total of 64 over the course of his lifetime), bowl-

ed and played in and judged old time fiddling contests throughout the Northwest and across Canada.

Among his awards and achievements, Allan prized winning the 1978 Idaho State Fiddling Championship, earning trophies for his "300" unsanctioned game and his handful of 700 series, judging the National Old Time Fiddlers Contest twice - once as regular and once as alternate judge, and judging the Central Canadian Fiddle Contest at Austin, Manitoba, twice.

In 1996 son Joel opened MCCBS Recording Studio in Bonners Ferry which allowed Allan to record 16 CDs and tapes of his music, to self-publish three volumes of his own tunes and four volumes of adventures and remembrances of his life growing up during his early years in Canada, and to complete a five volume video series on "How to Build a Violin Plain and Simple" from start to finish.

The most surprising achievement for Allan though was having a newspaper article, "Fiddler on the Net," picked up by the AP after which he received orders and calls from across the U.S. as well as from Australia (an order for a left-handed chin rest), Hong Kong, Egypt and Switzerland. Shortly thereafter, KSPS in Spokane came up to his home in Bonners Ferry and filmed a show for "Profiles Northwest" about his fiddle making shop.

In addition to his wife and children, Allan is survived by his sisters: Doris Howard, Donnie Howard, Annie Ritz, Jessie Schlener and Ruth Hoglan each of whom learned three tunes on the fiddle and were awarded by brother Al with one of his hand-crafted violins. Of course, Doris and Ruth went on to learn many more tunes and play in many contests. Allan is also survived by three brothers, Jim, Dan and Ken MacDonald. He also leaves behind dear friend and fellow fiddler, Charlie Beaton, of Cranbrook, B.C.

Graveside services were held Oct. 13 at Paradise Valley Cemetery. Mu-

On Nov. 20, 1939, he married Margie Nickel of Kamiah at Grangeville, and they lived at Kooskia, Pierce, Kamiah and Lewiston until 1944, when he entered the U.S. Army Air Force, where he trained to be a gunner on a B-17. The war ended in Europe and he was transferred to Air Sea Rescue and stationed in Casa Blanca, Morocco.

After the war he bought a small farm near Kamiah and worked for the Idaho Transportation Department.
